

I began my service as a deacon this January. As a deacon of practical needs, all of my duties are behind the scenes, coordinating visits for people who have been hospitalized or families who have just added a new baby to their number. I don't do the visits myself and I don't have much direct contact with church members in need of care, but arrange for someone else to provide the care they need. Doing this kind of behind the scenes service has afforded me a special opportunity to see how our Caregiving Ministry operates.

For me it has been a privilege to see the dedication to caring for our church family and the servant hearts of our church leadership and volunteer team members. For every person visited in the hospital, every casserole delivered, and every person expressing interest in getting more involved at West Hills there are numerous people working behind the scenes to make that happen. There are meetings, trainings, emails, and thoughtful discussions devoted to the topic of how to best offer care and support to each of our members.

As I am now able to see this in action on a regular basis, I realize how much I took this for granted prior to becoming a part of it. I never thought about how the person who came to visit me after the birth of my son knew to get in contact with me, nor did I think much about who made the meal she brought us or who knitted the sweet baby blanket in our care package. When I've received a phone call or a note in the mail from someone checking in on me and telling me they are praying for me, I was glad to receive it, but certainly didn't realize all the work that went into it.

As I have become more aware of this, I have been touched by it. I am touched by all the people willing to work hard behind the scenes for our congregation and feel this service truly embodies the humble servant heart Jesus asks us to have toward one another in Philippians 2:3-4. "Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility value others above yourselves, not looking to your own interests but each of you to the interests of others."

As I was reflecting on what I most wanted to communicate through writing this article, I decided I wanted you to know that this humble attitude of service means you are loved. As a member of our church family, people you may not have met or know personally are choosing to love you through their service without expectation of acknowledgment or recognition. I hope that that knowledge is a blessing to you as it has been to me, and that the next time you are a recipient of some form of Caregiving that you will feel the love of those who orchestrated it.

Why Do Women Attend Bible Study Groups?

According to a recent survey throughout the Midwest, women are more inclined to attend a Bible Study Group than men, and women who attend Bible Study Groups usually (90%) will return year after year. Some of the reasons given were no different than the women who were asked that same question who attend West Hills Church. Many women felt that Bible Study “allows us to sit at the feet of Jesus” and listen to his teaching, as Mary did while her sister Martha “stewed” in the kitchen. Bonnie Aden said it gave her “fellowship and the opportunity to pray for each one of us as well as really learning the Bible.”

“You and I will not be equipped to do what God has called us to do if we do not have a relationship with God through His Word.” This

is a quote from Beth Moore, one of the women who writes wonderful Bible studies. She is right!

Since retiring, it is my privilege to attend both Wednesday morning and Thursday morning Bible studies at West Hills. Looking back, through all those hours in the Word, makes me even more thirsty.

One of my discoveries is that I can read a book of the Bible today and it is a fresh word, even though I read that same scripture a year ago. God’s message is the same, yesterday, today and tomorrow. He speaks to us directly - what we need to hear, when we need to hear it! For me, that is the joy in studying His Word!” This shared by Angie Arner.

Pat King, who has been attending Bible Study Groups for more years than she can count felt the years of friendships she has made as well as the encouragement and prayer support from others in the group were invaluable. She also said she has always been “awed by the preparation and dedication of the teachers.” Jane Noden attends Bible Study in order to grow more in her faith. She has experienced others in the Thursday Bible Study group that she attends who are “ready to learn, feel free to discuss and share, as well as have fun while learning about God’s word.” She also added that her family and friends know her calendar is always marked on Thursday mornings

for Bible Study and “they don’t ask me to schedule something at that time and day!” Ilene Hawkins stated it was “very important for our spiritual growth.” Marguerite Coleman said she is a “quiet person” and needs more socializing which “Bible Study gives me.” She enjoys the lessons, breaking up into smaller groups and discussing the lessons with others in more detail. She said “even though I don’t talk much I love to listen and learn.” She also felt a Bible Study Group

is important to hear the many perceptions and interpretations from “the younger women and the more mature women that are in the group.” Wendi Meyer summarized the experience and the reasons by stating: “Each lady is like a unique and lovely flower, so individual and so special. Gathered together

we are like a bountiful bouquet, made up of the single blossoms. Jesus Christ definitely lives and breathes His love and care into each participant, meeting us where we are on that day, at that moment.” Beautifully stated.

We hope you will join one of “our bouquets!” On Wednesday mornings at 9:15 a.m. in the chapel beginning September 7, the women will be studying, The Armor of God, a Priscilla Shirer DVD study. This study has homework and there is a \$14 participant’s book fee. The teachers will be Tracy Enholm and Jessica Thorberg.

Or you may like to join us on Thursday mornings, starting on September 8, where the group will be studying The Gospel of Luke. This group meets in the chapel at 9:15 a.m. and we encourage you to bring your Bible. The teachers will be Lou Dye, Deena Candler, Jackie O’Dell and Gloria Zinn. Childcare will be provided both days.

Please make this the year that you plan to learn more about the Bible and share with other women in strengthening your faith. Whether you know nothing about the Bible and only hear a sermon on an occasional Sunday, or you are a student of the Bible and can’t get enough of the Word, Bible Study is made for you. You will not be expected to say a word, but you will be encouraged by what you learn. Come join us.

Recently I had a nice visit with an American pastor. I noticed a stack of stationary on his desk with the phrase, "God Bless America." It brought to mind many presidential speeches that I have heard, closing with the same phrase, "God bless America." And so, I began to contemplate this saying, asking myself, "why should God bless America?"

Maybe many people across America are coming to faith in Christ. Maybe the churches are growing and filling up with new believers. Or maybe there are many preachers and evangelist proclaiming the Gospel in public squares across America. Maybe America is so full of preachers and evangelists that now they are being sent all across the globe, spreading the gospel. Why should God bless America? Maybe because America has embraced Christian culture and teachings. Maybe that's why we never hear about gay marriage or anything else in opposition to the teachings of Christ. Or maybe God should bless America because the administration has demonstrated an honest, transparent Christian approach to building American society, inspiring love, peace, and faithful work, in service to the whole world. And this is where I became confused. I returned to Scripture to see the causal relationship with God's blessings.

Genesis 12:1-2

Now the LORD SAID TO ABRAM,
"[a]Go forth from your country, And from your relatives
And from your father's house,
To the land which I will show you;
2 And I will make you a great nation,
And I will bless you,
And make your name great;
And so [b] you shall be a blessing;

God commanded Abram to leave his country, and in verse 4, Abram obeyed the call. Also in Genesis 22:2 Later, God gives Abraham a more difficult command:

Genesis 22:2

He said, "Take now your son, your only son, whom you love, Isaac, and go to the land of Moriah, and offer him there as a burnt offering on one of the mountains of which I will tell you." So Abraham rose early in the morning and saddled his donkey, and took two of his young men with him and Isaac his son; and he split wood for the burnt offering, and arose and went to the place of which God had told him."

Abraham's destiny tied blessing with obedience.

Scripture records the many blessings of God to the nation of Israel. God gave his name to the people of Israel. He treated them as the

first child. God chose the nation of Israel, not because he's divisive or nationalistic, rather because God willed to enter the history of mankind through the incarnation by way of the nation of Israel. God chose Israel as a prophet, declaring the glory of God to all the nations of the earth, calling many people to himself. For this reason, God gave Israel the land, the promises, and the adoption (Romans 9:4-5).

Sadly, the nation of Israel distanced themselves from God, worshiped idols, mixed with other nations, failed to keep the Sabbath holy (Nehemiah 13). Even so, God continued to call Israel to himself by way of the prophets and messengers. They refused the words of God. The result of the refusal was the Babylonian captivity. God not only sent prophets, he came in the flesh, and lived among them. They saw his miracles. The result was that they added to their stubborn refusal. We see that God, the one that showered Israel with blessings, is the same who punished them.

Luke 13:33


"O Jerusalem, Jerusalem, the city that kills the prophets and stones those sent to her! How often I wanted to gather your children together, just as a hen gathers her brood under her wings, and you would not have it!"

What Is Capernaum?

In Jesus' day Capernaum was the hub of Jesus' ministry. Many healings took place in that city. It was known as "The Village of Comfort." There couldn't be a better name, then, to give to the part of Young Life Ministries that helps children with disabilities have fun, make friends, develop self-esteem and begin a relationship with Jesus Christ. It is the fastest growing part of Young Life Ministries worldwide.

You may not be aware that West Hills hosts a group of children with disabilities at their Capernaum meetings held on Thursday nights. About 25-30 kids meet here at our church with caring volunteer leaders who are willing to spend time with the kids, encouraging them and giving them an opportunity to share their struggles, fears and needs and help them to be all God designed them to be. They play games, have activities, sing, listen to encouraging talks from scripture that let them know how much God loves them and, of course, have a snack. They have two camping experiences during the summer. One is a weekend camp, for many of them it is the first time to be away from home. This not only gives kids a camping experience but also gives parents respite from caring for their child 24/7; but, is not too far away if the need arises to go home earlier than planned. The second camp is at a Young Life property and is for a whole week. The past five years we have done inclusion camping, which means we attend a Young Life camp with all the other high school students from the Omaha area that are involved in Young Life. This year they went to Lampe, Missouri to Clear Water Cove. All week they talk about the brokenness of all mankind and how Jesus has redeemed us all. The kids are encouraged to go outside for some quiet time with God. A young man named Brenden was one of those children. Brenden came from a broken home, put in foster care and about four years ago was adopted by a caring family. After his quiet time he came up to Ann and said; "now that Jesus has opened my heart everything has changed." Brenden's family feels his heart has definitely been changed since he's been a part of Capernaum. The children are given the opportunity to be a




part of a group of people, young and old, who become their friends, mentors and encouraging partners.

As a volunteer Debbie Chadwick feels her life has changed as well. Debbie is in her fourth year working with the kids through Capernaum. One encounter was especially touching. She was discussing the subject of "death" with a teen who had apparently thought a lot about it. He turned to Debbie and said "I am not afraid of death. I will be here and then I will go to be with Jesus and THEN I will be normal like everyone else." Debbie thought "if he only knew how extraordinary he is right now, and how blessed we would be if all teens had his wisdom, his heart and his relationship with God." Debbie and all the other Capernaum leaders and volunteers who have accepted the opportunity to extend their hearts to these children with disabilities have truly fulfilled the scripture at Matthew 25:40 where Jesus said those who extend kindness "to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me." Even Debbie admits to seeing Jesus in the eyes of these children.

Young Life and Capernaum can always use support either monetarily or through volunteers. The main fund raiser for Young Life is a Gala that will be held this year at The Paxton on September 9, 2016. Young Life will be celebrating 75 years of helping young people come to know Jesus. The Master of Ceremonies will be John Knicely and the main speaker will be Bill Paige. Book Review



The Soul Cafe has within its walls, and ready to be checked out, a book listed as one of the 25 books every Christian should read.

“The Seven Storey Mountain” (1948) was written by Thomas Merton a Trappist Monk who wrote more than 70 books which were published in 15 languages in addition to essays and reviews. This autobiography, tells the story of his conversion to Catholicism and his pioneering talks with the Dalai Lama, and other prominent Asian spiritual figures.

Merton who was ordained to the priesthood in 1949 wrote mainly on the topics of spirituality and social justice.

His book “The Seven Storey Mountain” was published at the end of WWII and was attributed to the sudden interest of veterans, students and others in the monastic life.

The National Review listed the book as one of the “100 best non-fiction” books of the century.

Many have called his book life changing, citing the following reasons:

- It reminded people that prayer was for everyone
- It made it acceptable to investigate other religions such as Buddhism and Zen
- He worked toward social justice for all
- He reminded his readers that “everyone is both extraordinary and ordinary”

Merton wrote, *“Why do we spend our lives striving to be something we would never want to be, if we only knew what we wanted? Why do we waste our time doing things, which, if we only stopped to think about them are the opposite of what we were made for?”*

You will want to check out the autobiography of this remarkable man.
