Called to Encourage by Patti Brownlee

"Therefore encourage one another and build one another up, just as you are doing." | Thessalonians 5:11

"Encourage one another daily, as long as it is called 'today,' so that none of you may be hardened by sin's deceitfulness."

Discouragement is experienced by all of us at times. Everyone knows what it's like to feel "down," insignificant, immobilized, confused-when the question you are most frequently asking God is "Why?" But in response to discouragement, God, who knows us so well because He experienced the full scope of human emotions during His time on earth-has commanded believers to encourage each other daily. What does this mean and how should we do so?

Encouragement is defined by Webster as giving someone support, confidence or hope and persuading someone to do or continue something. A very positive definition but one we often see lived out in daily life as flattery, schmoozing, or empty words. When God commands us to be encouragers, however, He means the kind of encouragement we read about in His Word. Frequent encouragement references are found in the Old Testament, and the Greek word for encouragement, *parakaleo* which means "a call to one's side," appears 105 times in the New Testament. Christian encouragement is calling someone to your side in order to help, comfort, strengthen or guide them by claiming God's love, His truth, and our shared victory with Him. Christian encouragement reminds us that God created us for a purpose and that He is in control.

To be an encourager as God commands, here are a few points to consider and practice:

1. Dig into the Bible, and whenever possible use His words as your encouraging words. Remember-secular encouragement and Christian encouragement are vastly different. One is based on positive thinking and the other is based on God's truth. Here are just a couple of many examples of the difference. Secular encouragement says: "Everything will work out;" but the Bible says in Philippians 2:13 *"God works all things together for good for those who love Him."* Secular encouragement says: "You can do it;" but the Bible says in Philippians 4:13 *"I can do everything through Him who gives me strength."*
2. Be specific in your encouragement. Let a person know the specific quality, talent, choice or pursuit that you appreciate and is pleasing to God and others. Employ all available resources. Remember how much encouraging words have meant to you. *"Pleasant words are a honeycomb, sweet to the soul, and healing to the bones."* Proverbs 16:24
3. Just do it! Be intentional. Sometimes we fail to encourage others because of our own insecurities. We worry that what we say

will be misunderstood or that the timing isn't right. When you question your effectiveness as an encourager, remember the words of Proverbs 3:27 *“Do not withhold good from those who deserve it, when it is in your power to act.”* Rely upon God to direct your Encouraging words and actions.

4. Most importantly, pray that God will help you become an encourager. Pray for God to make you aware of people and situations in which encouragement can make a difference. Pray that the members of West Hills Church will love and encourage one another in specific ways and will leave its doors equipped to be encouragers. A beautiful prayer that we can use or can serve as a model for us is the following prayer written by Aubrey Johnson and found in her book, **The Barnabas Factor**.

The Encourager's Prayer

Dear Father:

Thank you for a new day and the opportunities it will afford me to encourage someone in your name.

Thank you for helping me overcome my fears by giving me a spirit of power and of love and of a sound mind.

Thank you for helping me overcome discouragement by reminding me of Your unlimited power and abiding presence.

Thank you for helping me to live courageously and relate effectively.

Teach me to use my mind to encourage others by focusing on solutions rather than complaining or assigning blame.

Teach me to use my eyes to encourage others by looking for good in every person and circumstance.

Teach me to use my ears to encourage others by being quick to hear, slow to speak, and slow to wrath.

Teach me to use my lips to encourage others by speaking words of hope and healing.

Teach me to use my hands to encourage others by doing small deeds of kindness expecting nothing in return.

Today, Lord, I will help someone to build by nudging her one step closer to her dreams.

Today, Lord, I will help someone blossom by refusing to give up on him no matter how low he has fallen.


Today, Lord, I will help someone believe by showing her she is valuable, lovable, and capable.

The Great Omission

In Matthew 28: 19-20 (NIV) Jesus gives us the Great Commission: *“Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I will be with you always, to the very end of the age.”*

In his book, “The Great Omission,” Dallas Willard discusses his belief that

Christians have followed this command by “making Christians, NOT disciples.”

What makes Willard's book so bold, is his belief that we can be Christians without necessarily being disciples. It is possible for us to live our Christian lives without applying discipleship.

According to RELEVANT magazine, “Although Willard has always shown concern about how we live as Disciples of Christ, he has never spoken more urgently about the need to “DO” Christianity not just think and talk about it.”

This 229 page book speaks to being: Apprenticed to Jesus, Spiritual Formation and the Development of Character, and Discipleship of the Soul and Mind. In addition, there are excerpts from books on Spiritual Living: Visions and Practices.

Willard makes a compelling case for us all to be disciples, “apprentices” of Jesus.

Dallas Willard is also the author of such groundbreaking books as “The Divine Conspiracy” and “The Spirit of the Disciplines.”

1. What is your favorite color? My favorite color is blue...many different hues of blue, but currently, I think it's more of an aquamarine.

There were of course, other times over the years that the Holy Spirit moved me to recommit my life and grow in my faith. And nothing makes you grow more than trials, so I've had a few of those growth spurts along the way too.

4. If you could ask God a question, what would it be?

5. Do you have a particular time of day you like to spend with God? Well I'm not great in the morning, but I am much better at communicating with Him... and everybody else for that matter... at night. However, my favorite time of day to "be still" and feel His presence, is dusk. Just after the sun has gone below the horizon, when there's still some hazy light, and the air is still. It's peaceful and easier for me to "hear" His voice during the quiet. Unfortunately those are not every day opportunities for me right now. So my time with God usually has to be more intentional

during the day or evening. But what I love the most is when He surprises me with moments that clearly let me know He is present with me and in control! And that can be anytime, day or night or even in the morning!

6. What do you love most about Brenton? EVERYTHING! But the thing I love most about Brenton is how much he loves and respects my daughter Christina and what a great dad he is to my grandsons! And, I love that he likes me! It's really nice to feel loved by your son-in-law.

7. How did you choose your girls' names? My girls are the only girls in either of our families and we didn't have a lot of female names that I cared to pass along. (Birdie? Dolly? Gertrude??) So we went with names we liked. When choosing a name for our first daughter, I wanted to call her Christy, but decided she should have a more formal legal name, just in case she grew up to be a judge. So we named her Christina. She hated the name Christy and announced at age six that she was to be called Christina. For our second daughter, we liked the name Jenny, but again with the whole judge scenario in mind, we went with Jennifer. Neither one have become judges...yet.

Do you have a most memorable family vacation? Maui, the summer after Christina graduated high-school. I figured it was our last family vacation just the four of us, and I was right. The girls were miserable without their boyfriends but I loved it!

8. How do you pray for your grandchildren? First and foremost, I pray for them to grow up to be loving men & women of God who have a personal relationship with Jesus. Secondly, I pray that God will give them good husbands and wives to share the journey with them. And of course there's the normal wish we all have for our kids, to grow up to be healthy, well adjusted, productive human beings.

12. What are some of your goals as assistant to the Caregiving Pastor? To try to keep Deena out of trouble. It's a full-time job.

I just want to say that I'm truly grateful for all the blessings God has given me. It's a privilege to work here serving my West Hills family, working with Deena and our great staff.

The children then go into their respective classrooms for their Christian lessons. There they are met by loving volunteers who spend an hour helping the children to know Jesus.

Laressa Tromler is one of those teachers who has been volunteering for 28 years. "It is the joy of my week" says Laressa. "Every child needs to know they are loved by God. They hold on to that feeling." Laressa loves the children's curiosity. "They love to learn" she says and "I love it when they come and give me a hug even after they're older and they see me in church."

Steve says he loves it when he can see on the children's faces that the lesson "has really clicked." The Kid's Church really gives the children a good foundation for their faith.


